COSTA RICA: Marine Conservation & Sea Turtle Expedition

The beaches of Costa Rica are yours to explore this summer. Discover what you can do for the future of the planet as you learn about sea turtle conservation and ocean stewardship.

OVERVIEW

Experience Costa Rica's world-renowned beaches and national parks full of natural wonders. Small coastal communities will become your home away from home. As you travel the Pacific coastline during your expedition, you will contribute to conservation projects addressing climate change and learn to be environmental stewards. On the Nicoya Peninsula, spend a week learning about sea turtle conservation and supporting other wildlife native to the area. Next, head south and explore world-famous Manuel Antonio National Park.

For those on the 21-Day Flagship Program, your expedition will take you further south, down to the Osa Peninsula, where you'll discover what it takes to become an ocean steward. Throughout this traveling adventure, you will go deep into the impacts of climate

SPOTLIGHT ON COMMUNITY SERVICE

Students will earn either 35 hours of service or 50 hours of service, depending on whether they select the 14-day or 21-day program option. Service work will include projects with various nonprofits, NGOs and local communities, all focused around marine and wildlife conservation, as well as environmental stewardship. We will plug into existing projects to help protect sea turtles, the ocean and the incredible forests of Costa Rica. Costa Rica is world-renowned for its conservation practices, and we will learn about their innovation, but also see firsthand the impacts of tourism, pollution and climate change on its many habitats. GLA students will not only explore these issues, but lend a hand to make an impact on these precious ecosystems.

SAMPLE ITINERARY: DAILY BREAKDOWN

Actual schedule of activities will vary by program session. The information detailed here is typical for what you can expect to experience; however, service work and activities vary depending upon the needs of our local community partners, various celebrations and customs, as well as the weather and specific needs of the student group.



DAY 1: WELCOME TO COSTA RICA!

Fly into San José (SJO) where staff will be waiting to greet you with open arms. Meet up with your fellow travelers and get acquainted with your new travel pod. We will stay one night near San Jose to recover from travel, and then depart the next morning as we journey four hours to the Nicoya Peninsula to our Home Base located steps from the beach.

DAY 2: ORIENTATION & SEA TURTLE CONSERVATION

Wake up to the sounds of the ocean and wildlife, and get ready for an extensive orientation to go over group objectives, service expectations, and helpful hints to help get accustomed to the culture. Break into Mentor groups and get to know each other better with icebreakers and group activities before heading out to our first day of service at the sea turtle hatchery to meet the leaders of the organization and start our service work. In the evening, we will do our primary leadership anchor activity and get context for conservation in Costa Rica.



DAYS 3 - 6: SEA TURTLE CONSERVATION SERVICE, FIRST NATIONAL PARK & BIOLUMINESCENCE BOATING

Service time! Meet up with organization leaders to learn about how you'll be helping with community projects. Our work will be physical and include constructing turtle hatcheries on the beach, measuring and marking patrol routes of sea turtle nesting locations, as well as planting and reforestation in the area. We will also do night patrols to protect turtle eggs and other work to support the sea turtles and their habitat. We'll break up into teams for our projects, and also use the time to practice communicating in Spanish with our local counterparts. We will hike and explore the first National Park of Costa Rica, and go kayaking to see the bioluminescence of wildlife off the coast. In the evenings, reflect with your fellow GLA students and Mentors on the impact of service, your leadership journey and our cross-cultural experiences.

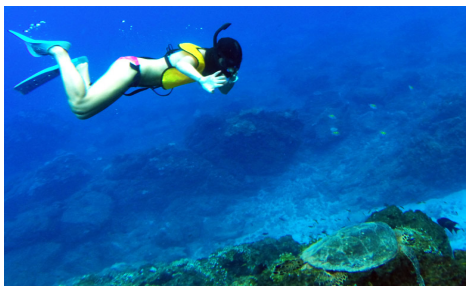


DAY 7: JOURNEY TO OUR NEXT BEACHSIDE COMMUNITY

Experience the back roads of Costa Rica as you wind your way down the Pacific coast and even take a ferry ride where you can spot dolphins. Stop along the way and enjoy lunch and see the famous crocodiles. By early evening we will arrive at our next home base situated on the beautiful Pacific Ocean.

DAYS 8 - 12: CONSERVATION SERVICE, ZIPLINING, AND PURA VIDA CULTURE

We'll get back to work with the community of Parrita, where we'll continue with new conservation projects for local nonprofits and NGOs. We'll go deeper into our learning about environmental stewardship and learn about Costa Rica's global Initiatives in this realm. Support local conservation initiatives including infrastructure building, beach clean ups



and other tasks as needed by the local leaders of the community organizations. In addition to half days of service, we will go ziplining through the rainforest canopy, spend a day hiking and swimming in Manuel Antonio National Park where we will encounter monkeys and maybe even a sloth. In the afternoons, we'll try our hand at cooking the local cuisine, play games, learn local dance and have time to enjoy our natural surroundings at the beach and swimming pool.

DAY 13-14: SERVICE WRAP UP & FAREWELL 14-DAY

Today we will wrap up our service projects in this beach community and for our students on the 14-day program, it's time to say goodbye to your new friends and to the community that has served as your home away from home. Enjoy a celebratory meal together and reflect on both our accomplishments as well as what we've learned *together*.

The 14-day students will trek to San Jose, the capital to prepare for last minute souvenirs and departures the following morning. For those on the 21-day program, we will have a reset as a group at sunset and one final night at this Home Base before continuing our adventure further south.

DAYS 15 - 18: OCEAN STEWARDSHIP & SERVICE, SNORKEL AT CANO ISLAND, SURFING & WATERFALLS

On the 21-day program, we start our last week together arriving at our final beachside community in Uvita. We will meet the leaders of our service project and provide support on projects ranging from seed planting and reforestation to beach clean ups. On the way to Marino Ballena National Park we will pass by the famous whale made by previous GLA groups and constructed entirely of recycled plastic bottles that has turned into an educational art demonstration for the public.

At Marino Ballena National Park we will discover the pristine beaches and abundant wildlife which it is so well known for. Ballena is Spanish for "whale," so named for the shape of the park. Explore the natural beauty of the park--if we're lucky, we might spot sloths, monkeys or tropical birds. Students will get a chance to take a crash course in surfing, as well as boat to the incredible *Cano Island*, where we will snorkel with the various marine life. In addition, we will meet and hear from guest speakers and local leaders about how this region is one of the most biologically diverse on earth, and what we can do to become ocean stewards.

Each region of Costa Rica is so distinct! We'll explore this peninsula through a waterfall hike and through spending time on the pristine beaches after service.





DAYS 19-20: VOLCANO HIKE, FINAL REFLECTION & CELEBRATION

More adventure! We'll rise early and travel towards the center of the country, near the capitol San Jose, and have the opportunity to hike the active Poas Volcano. We will also do our final reflections and leadership activities as our 3-week journey comes to an end. We'll enjoy a celebratory dinner and reflect on both our accomplishments and learnings.

DAY 21: DEPARTURES After breakfast and final goodbyes, we'll head to the airport where GLA staff will check students in for their journey home. ¡Adiós!

TRAVELING TO COSTA RICA

GLA HOME BASE | GLA operates multiple home bases for this program. Each one is an eco-lodge or small hotel, steps from the beach with modest and typical amenities, and a final one near the airport for departures.

FOOD | Costa Rica is known for its simple diet of rice, beans and a side of meat. The food at Home Base will reflect the traditional dietary staples of the people in Costa Rica. It will be simple, but fresh and healthy and include delicious, locally-grown fruits.

CLIMATE | Although summer is the middle of the rainy season, Costa Rica typically experiences a mini dry season in July. Rainfall decreases significantly for three or four weeks, especially in the northern Pacific. This makes for hot, sunny days and cooling evening rains.

LEADERSHIP

Global Leadership Adventures started as an educational institute, so we continue to think and act like educators—not tour operators—as we deliver life-changing programs. We intentionally weave a leadership curriculum into the daily experience on our programs. Through group discussion, meaningful service, workshops, speakers and excursions, staff guide students to reflect on program events through the lens of leadership, and celebrate outstanding examples of leaders they encounter in the local community. Lending this context to the experience creates opportunities for students to dig deep into their vision, purpose and knowledge of themselves and the world.

Be present

Our mission at GLA is “to inspire the next generation to realize their potential to transform the world and their role in it.” To that end, we expect GLA students to maintain high standards of personal behavior and to be open-minded.
